The ideal contributor:

- Has familiarity with understanding and assessing the quality of technical and academic research.
- Will be able to source research from a diverse range of perspectives and fields.
- Will be able to organize and synthesize information into a coherent framework, connecting research from a variety of sources into one clear story.
- Be a clear communicator with writing that is free of spelling or grammatical errors.
- Will have an interest in Diversity, Equity and Inclusion and how to integrate concepts of gender, race, LGBTQIA+, and other underrepresented aspects of identity into a variety of topics.
 - For example: For the topic "Seek & Give Feedback Courageously", we not only want to know the research behind feedback seeking and giving, but also how a person's gender, race, etc may affect the frequency or type of feedback they typically get.
- Cites information thoroughly and accurately.
- Should have their own access to research.

Literature Reviews are compensated on a project basis. Typically, we compensate writers \$700 for a first literature review and more for subsequent pieces of writing. Timelines for completion are flexible and can be established based on individual needs. Previous researchers/writers have spent 30-40 hours on the project but this will vary by person and topic.

- Samples should reflect your ability to integrate research from multiple sources into a clear story. If
 more than two samples are submitted, additional samples may be examples of writing that is not
 research-specific (does not include multiple sources).
